## Sexual Assault Sequelae

- 1. Recognize the problem of sexual assault in Canada
- 2. Understand the complexity of sexual assault within the context of individual and social experience (Describe societal factors)
  - a. Identify rape myths situated in the broader social context
  - Reflect on how social factors such as racism, sexism, ableism, colonialism and others intersect, affecting the experience of sexual assault, access to and care provided by services
  - c. Describe challenges associated with the issue of consent
  - d. Recognize how the broader social context can shape individual biases which can impact the provision of care.
- 3. Understand the (neurobiology of) trauma of sexual assault
  - Recognize the physical, social, emotional and psychological outcomes of sexual assault
  - b. Describe the neurobiological response to trauma
  - c. Recognize the potential effects of trauma for re-victimization
- 4. Understand and identify commonly misunderstood reactions to sexual assault

Explain why sexual assault may be unacknowledged by the survivor

## 5. Know how to respond to commonly misunderstood reactions to sexual assault

Be able to:

- Create safe and supportive spaces for disclosure
- Modify service provision to make it more accessible and comfortable for diverse clients
- Respond to survivors who have experienced (re)victimization
- Provide information about local resources and appropriate referrals
- Respond to survivors who may not acknowledge their experience as sexual assault

## 6. Reflect on your own beliefs, values and practices

- a. Recognize how your values, attitudes, beliefs and experiences may shape and influence your response to survivors of sexual assault
- b. Examine your emotional responses to the commonly misunderstood, behaviours of survivors of sexual assault
